Voter Registration

being registered and staying registered

- How do I to register?

- www.vote.pa.gov
- Department of Transportation (DOT)
- In the Election Bureau Office
 - 1 Courthouse Sq, Tunkhannock, PA 18657
 - (570) 996-2226

- What do I need to register?

- A Wyoming County residential address
 - A precinct/polling place is assigned based on your residential address
 - A PO Box can be used as a mailing address
- A form of identification
 - A Pennsylvania State ID or Driver's License is best, but you may also use the last four digits of your SSN

- Do I have to renew my registration?

- Not if you vote or regularly update your registration





Voter Registration

Updates & Renewals

- What do you mean “update” my registration?
 - Name and address changes
 - When you get married or move (even if it’s to a different apartment)
- How do I update my registration?
 - Same as registering
 - www.vote.pa.gov
 - Department of Transportation (DOT)
 - Election Bureau Office
- Doesn’t it get updated when I move?
 - Not unless you tell us. USPS does not update your voter registration.
- If you do any of the above, your voter registration is considered current.
- **Also, Vote!**
 - If you vote regularly, you decrease chances of any issues

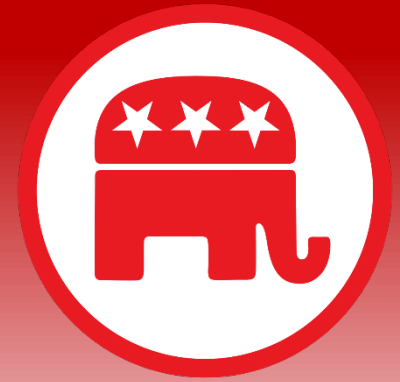
Speaking of Voting.....

- When?
 - At least twice a year, every year!
 - Primary, General and possibly a Special Election
- How?
 - In person
 - By Absentee or Mail-In Ballot
- Where?
 - At your polling place on Election Day
 - In your PJs (absentee or mail-in ballot)
 - In the Election Bureau office (absentee or mail-in ballot) up to a week before the election





Primary Elections



- What is a Primary Election?
 - In PA, a Primary Election is used to nominate candidates or delegates for the Major Political Parties
- Who can vote in a Primary Election?
 - Major Political Parties select their candidates to move forward
 - In PA, only the Democratic and Republican Parties qualify
- Referendums
 - A separate ballot is created for all other voters to use
- When is the Primary Election?
 - May for most elections but April in a Presidential Primary Election

General Elections

- What is a General Election?
 - Where voters elect candidates to hold an elected office
- Who can vote in a General Election?
 - Any registered voter
- When is the General Election?
 - Always in November

Special Elections?

- When a state level office is vacated part way through a term
- Can be held at the same time as another election

Municipal vs Federal Elections

- What is a Municipal Election?
 - A Municipal Election is a local election
 - County and municipal offices as well as some judicial
 - Odd years only
- Why does this election matter?
 - You elect the people that manage the day-to-day affairs in your school district, township, borough, and county
- What is a Federal Election?
 - State and Federal offices
 - Even years only



Ways to Vote



- **At your polling place**
 - Polling places are open 7am-8pm every Election Day
 - You can find your polling place by going to www.wyomingcountypa.gov/elections or www.vote.pa.gov
 - If it is your first time voting at your polling place, please take a form of ID
 - You will sign the poll book by your name before you are issued a ballot
 - Wyoming County polling places use paper ballots
 - Clear Cast 2.3
 - You put your own ballot in the scanner when you're done
 - You may have someone come with you to help you fill out a ballot
 - Declaration of Need for Assistance
- **Absentee or Mail-In Ballot**
 - You must apply for an absentee or mail-in ballot
 - The deadline is a week before the election
 - Absentee vs Mail-In
 - There is no difference in ballots, only the applications for the ballots. Absentee is for an illness or being absent on election day.

Ways to Vote, Continued

- Absentee or Mail-In Ballot, continued
 - “Permanent” aka Annual List
 - We will mail you an application once a year, by the first week in February
 - You still must complete the application every year
 - If you apply online, and state you will be out of the area, you are applying for an absentee application
 - Absentee applications are not annual and must be submitted every election unless you submit a paper application by reason of illness with a doctor’s signature. Electronic Absentee applications can not have a doctor’s signature.
 - The ballot will be mailed to whichever address you place on the application for the entire year
 - In Wyoming for May but in Florida for November?
 - You may turn in your ballot to the office in person or by mail
 - You may only turn in your own ballot
 - Not your spouses, children or parents
 - POA are not recognized in Elections
 - Ballots require one stamp, Signature and date



Ways to Vote, Continued

At the Election Bureau

- The Office is open 8:30am-4:00pm, Monday through Friday
 - The ballots are only available in the office a couple of weeks before the election (call first)
 - You must complete an absentee or mail-in ballot application before the deadline (7 days before the election)
 - There is no “early voting” in Pennsylvania. All ballots filled out before Election Day are absentee or mail-in ballots and require an application.
 - All absentee and mail-in ballots are opened on Election Day





Paper Ballots

- Regardless of whether you are voting at the polls or by absentee or mail-in ballot, you'll be voting on a paper ballot.
- Make sure to fill in the ovals
- If you are doing a write-in, you must fill in the oval and write a name on the line
- Only fill out your ballot with a blue or black pen

HOW TO CORRECTLY MARK YOUR BALLOT

Completely fill in the oval next to your selection.



Do not circle your selection or partially fill in the oval.
